2025 is a significant year for the library as we celebrate our 30th anniversary, a milestone made possible by your support, enthusiasm, and engagement. Over the years, we have become a cornerstone for curiosity, learning, and community connections, and we are thrilled to honor this legacy with special events and programs throughout the year—stay tuned for more details!

We continue to complete our strategic plan goals. A high priority we heard from the community was creating a more welcoming and comfortable environment, and you'll soon see some updated furniture near our entryways and a few other changes. We'll continue making improvements in phases to ensure minimal disruption, keeping the library a welcoming space for all to read, relax, work, and connect.

Our commitment to sustainability and environmental stewardship continues into 2025. With the assistance of dedicated volunteers, we are expanding our Library of Things collection to include items that support eco-friendly living—such as gardening tools and reusable household products. Additionally, ten community volunteers will work with library staff to codesign a sustainability-focused event in the spring designed to inspire greener habits. We aim to build a healthier, more resilient future for our community and will share more about this work throughout the year.

I'm excited to share that we are launching a robust volunteer initiative later this year. Volunteers have always been essential to our library, from curating art exhibits

I am proud to have shaped this legislation and will continue championing policies that safeguard the values at the heart of public libraries. I also encourage our supporters to advocate for continued federal funding to ensure libraries can thrive and serve their communities for generations.

Thank you for being an essential part of the library's journey. We look forward to celebrating, innovating, and growing with you this year and beyond!

a demonstration of the playback machines and assistance with the registration process.





Teen Services Looking Back, Looking Forward

2024 was an exciting year for teens at the library, who visited the teen room to hangout, do homework, take practice college admissions exams, play games, create projects, volunteer, and of course, to read. Last year, teens attended over 130 events held by the Teen Services department, including 120 teen volunteers who earned community service hours for helping the library.

One of their tasks was to pack and label seeds that are distributed to the community in our Seed Library. Over 1,300 seed packets were distributed, thanks to donations from Marin Master Gardeners and Ground. Teen volunteers also worked in the garden on the Teen Patio, assisted at programs, and served as room monitors, shelving books and keeping supplies clean and organized.

Student poets and artists were featured, and a new Classics Book Club was launched. In 2025, teens can look forward to a new Dungeons & Dragons Club and continued opportunities to take free SAT and ACT practice tests. Upcoming highlights include Marin Poetry Center's inauguration of the Youth Poet Laureate in April, which is National Poetry Month.

Teen readers will have new book clubs to participate in, and more books to read as the Young Adult collection grows. Graphic novels and manga are in high demand, and teens are gravitating towards

popular titles in mystery, romance and fantasy. Visit the Teen Room to see what's going on!
